Welcome to the first newsletter of 2023.

We were extremely fortunate to receive so many donations during December of both food and money. This puts us in a



good position to meet the challenges we will face for the remainder of this winter. A huge thank you to all of our wonderful supporters. And also to our volunteers for their hard work during the busy period in the run up to Christmas. We handed out 210 hampers to clients in addition to our usual food parcels.

The start of the new year is a time for us to take stock of where we are currently and to plan our strategy and requirements to meet the challenges ahead.

Last month we held the first ever strategy day for North Cotswold Foodbank. The day was led by the Trustees and involved our lead volunteers and employees.

Foodbank Britain: five months on the frontline of the new emergency service

In December, the Guardian published an article by a journalist who had spent the past five months talking to people who depend on the foodbank in one affluent area of London. They told their stories of struggle and solidarity, revealing the daily reality of the cost of living crisis.

Like communities across Britain, people in Earlsfield are facing an unprecedented struggle to meet basic living costs - many going without food, heat and electricity. On Thursday mornings, a queue forms outside the church from as early as 7am for the weekly foodbank. Its clientele, some of whom walk for as long as two hours to get there, includes new mothers and babies, pensioners, the unemployed, the homeless, people who are disabled, Ukrainian refugees and those who, despite having jobs, still cannot make ends

People told of their fears for the winter, how cost of living stresses had contributed to depression and suicidal thoughts, and many, including the elderly, said having to restrict food was affecting their health. Most said they would struggle to make further cutbacks, while many on prepayment meters said they were still having problems getting government assistance with their energy bills.

The effort put in by our volunteers at Tesco, the warehouse and our outlets was truly remarkable. Thank you to everyone who braved the cold (and the power cuts on the Saturday!) and supported us, including local MP Sir Geoffrey Clifton Brown at the Stow store.
