An estimated 65,000 visitors donated around three tonnes of food and toiletries which were distributed to foodbanks in the area, including North Cotswold. Rhian Morgan, pictured left, and other volunteers from North Cotswold Foodbank helped on the stand.



Tesco collection

It's always encouraging and humbling to see how generously our community supports families in crisis. Thank you to all the Tesco shoppers who donated to North Cotswold Foodbank at the recent Tesco Food Collection in Stow. The Tesco Food Collection is the UK's biggest charity food collection. Over the three days, we collected an amazing 1,300 kg of food, an increase of over 20% on last year! Tesco tops this up by 20% as a monetary donation, based on the estimated value of the food collected.

State of hunger

The State of Hunger report, commissioned by the Trussell Trust and carried out by Heriot-Watt University, is the largest ever piece of research conducted into poverty and foodbank use in the UK.

The report found that 94% of people who use a foodbank are in destitution, and the average weekly income after housing costs for a household needing to use a foodbank is just £50. Most people only have enough money to cover their housing costs – and nothing else. Almost one in five has no money coming in at all the month before being referred for emergency food. Almost three-quarters of people using foodbanks live in households affected by ill-health or disability.

THE AVERAGE WEEKLY INCOME AFTER HOUSING COSTS FOR PEOPLE REFERRED TO FOOD BANKS IS JUST £50.



One person said: "I've used the foodbank because I was on such a low income before I got my disability benefit. I had a mental breakdown because basically the amount they give me doesn't cover the costs of my rent."


This can't go on, and the evidence is clear. We can reach a future where no one needs a foodbank. Politicians on all sides must pledge to protect people from hunger by ensuring we all have enough money for the basics. We're asking all political parties to start working towards a future where no one needs a foodbank by:

- Ending the five-week wait for **Universal Credit**
- Making sure benefit payments cover the cost of living
- Investing in local emergency support for people in crisis

Foodbank use soars by 23%



The period from April to September was the busiest half-year period for foodbanks in the Trussell Trust's network since the charity opened. During the six months, 823,145 three-day emergency food parcels were given to people in crisis in the UK; more than a third of which went to children. This is a 23% increase on the same period in 2018 – the sharpest rate of increase the charity has seen for the past five years.

We have seen a similar situation here at North Cotswold Foodbank, with 265 threeday emergency food parcels given out over the six months, feeding a total of 888 people, of which almost half were children. This represents a 15% increase in the number of food parcels and a 26% increase in the number of people fed when compared to the same period last year.
